Since words can be ambiguous, the objective is to learn how to determine the Legislative Intent when a statute is silent, vague, or contradictory. L4 Analyze / L5 Evaluate 2. To develop the skill of applying different rules of construction based on the nature of the law. L3 Apply 3. To provide a deep understanding of the "Rules of the Game." Students must master linguistic maxims like Ejusdem Generis (words of the same kind) and Noscitur a Sociis (meaning from context) to resolve technical ambiguities in legal drafting. L3 Apply 4. To train students in the forensic use of Internal and External Aids. L4 Analyze 5. To ensure that every interpretation aligns with the Object of the Law and the Constitution. This involves the "Purposive Rule"—interpreting a statute in a way that promotes the purpose of the Act rather than defeating it through literal rigidity. L5 Evaluate
